DUNES: DO'S AND DON'TS

DO's

- Water existing and newly planted dune vegetation;
- Plant native dune grass and indigenous dune plants; Fertilize dune vegetation (2 pounds of slow-release 10-10-10 fertilizer per 1,000 sf of dune area);
- Install fence on top 1/3 of dune; Install seasonal fence at toe of dune to prevent foot traffic; Remove old metal fence posts;
- Use removable walkways and removable stairs;
- Install dune platforms after procurement of the required permit;
- Use singular foot pathway across dune and dune foreslope to get to beach. If heavy foot traffic is wearing a pathway low, then a removable or elevated walkway/stair system should be installed;
- Install irrigation with dune permit and plumbing permit;
- Fill low paths each fall with clean sand if pathway is worn low from foot traffic; Lift, fill underneath, and reset removable walkways each year;
- Apply for permits for installations/improvements within the dune system;
- Review Chapter XI: Protection of Beaches and Dunes of the Borough Ordinance;
- Call the Borough if you are unsure.

DON'TS

- o Play on the dune, this includes pet activity;
- Dig in the dunes;
- Lounge directly on the dune with blankets, beach chairs and umbrellas;
- Trample down vegetation to create access pathway across dune;
- Store kayaks, furniture, surf boards, toys, etc. directly on dune or in grass;
- Install metal fence posts;
- Litter in dunes;
- Remove sand from dune system for any reason;
- Conduct installations/improvements on the dune without appropriate permits when required;
- Cut or remove sand for the purposes of installing dune structures.
